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33rd Southern Maryland Celtic Festival Saturday, April 30th

April 30, 2011 marks the 33nd year for the oldest Celtic celebration in Maryland. Chosen in 2000 by Congressman Steny Hoyer to represent Southern Maryland in the national "Local Legacy" project of the Library of Congress' Bicentennial celebration, The Southern Maryland Celtic Festival and Highland Gathering highlights the heritage of the Breton, Cornish, Irish, Manx, Scots, and Welsh.

The festival is scheduled on the last Saturday of April every year from 10 AM to 6 PM Rain or Shine on the 560-acre Jefferson Patterson Park and Museum. While the park will allow pets, it would be less stressful for them if you left your furry friends at home.

More than 50 clans and societies have information to share. Three performing stages offer continuous music and dance featuring internationally known recording artists and groups. Watch craft and country-dance demonstrations and listen to harp, and Scottish fiddling while storytellers weave tales near grazing

sheep alongside historical displays, crafts and food. There is a Celtic market place for foods and gifts provide an old world atmosphere. All-day Competitions include pipers, fiddlers, highland dancers, athletes, drummers, pipe bands and Celtic harpers. After closing ceremonies, join us in the dance pavilion for the evening ceili. We're happy to present the Rovers again this year, starting at 6:30pm.

The Calvert County Sheriff's Department suggests everyone bring an extra set of car keys to their vehicle - just in case. Additionally, if you plan to stay past dark we recommend having a flashlight. All Lost and found, including human beings, should report to the General Admission gate for pick up.

Órla Fallon in Concert

April 6 & 7th, Barns at Wolf Trap



I have been privileged in the places that music has brought me," says Órla Fallon.

Given the places she's been these past years, it would be difficult to disagree. His Holiness the Pope, US Presidents Bill Clinton and George W. Bush and Irish President Mary McAleese, have all been a part of Órla's audiences throughout these past six years, both as a solo artist and with the phenomenally successful group Celtic Woman.

"Playing in such places as the White House or the Vatican, you never realize when you're growing up that you'll ever see inside these places, let alone sing and play. I think that's the wonder of the whole thing. It's amazing the doors that music can open up for you!"

Órla Fallon is a singer / harpist who comes from the village of Knockananna in County Wicklow, Ireland.

Since leaving Celtic Woman at the end of 2008, Órla has been charting a solo path that launched this past December with her very own American Public Television holiday special – Órla Fallon's Celtic Christmas. Her career is set to take off. Órla Fallon's Celtic Christmas put Órla back, dead center in the Public Television universe. More than 100 markets aired the show featured Órla and special guests including her former Celtic Woman band mate Méav, American Idol's David Archuleta, the original Riverdance choir, Anúna, and country singer Mark Wills.

Órla Fallon's Celtic Christmas, shot at the Polk Theatre in Nashville, TN in the Fall of 2010 included a DVD of the show and a special companion CD that included 20-time Grammy Award winner, 18-time CMA Award winner and Country Music Hall of Famer, Vince Gill. Gill makes a special appearance on the CD for a duet of "Little Drummer Boy" with Órla.

Now Órla is back in 2011 with, yet another, Public Television special debuting this Spring. My Land – Starring Órla Fallon is an Irish music, geographical and cultural celebration featuring the legendary Dubliners, Tommy Fleming, Damien Dempsey and the Dublin Gospel Choir. The show was shot on location throughout Ireland and Northern Ireland with a full length concert taped in Dublin this September 2010 at the majestic Royal Hospital Kilmainham (RHK) in Dublin. RHK is one of the finest 17th-century buildings in all of Ireland. Additional shooting for the show took place on location throughout Ireland and Northern Ireland at various locations including: The Cliffs of Moher, Sleah Head, the Dingle Peninsula, Forest Park in Gougane Barra, Rock of Cashel, Dublin, Portaferry, Strangford Lough and Downpatrick.

A woman that credits her late grandmother for instilling an abiding love of Irish music and traditional culture is now carving out a very successful solo career for herself. "I never imagined in a million years, that I would have been seen on Public Television over 14,000 times, have been a part of group that has sold more than 4 million CDs and DVDs and now as a new solo artist, being on stage with the likes of The Dubliners and the amazing David Archuleta from American Idol....and recording with Grammy Award winners Vince Gill and Moya Brennan....All within the same year... Wow!"



NEW PUB IN TOWN

In March a new Irish bar, The Limerick Pub, opened its doors at 11301 Elkin Street, Wheaton, MD. Neil Foley, one of the Limerick's owners, plays a great traditional Irish fiddle and intends the pub to be a new and vibrant home for traditional Irish music in the metropolitan area. On Friday and Saturday nights from 8 pm to midnight Neil will be performing with many of our favorite local traditional musicians. This week (April 8 & 9) he'll be sharing the stage with CB Heinemann.

The first set of dances included the North Kerry Set, the Clare Plain Set and the Haymaker's Jig. The pot luck tables were crammed with goodies, which were enjoyed during the first break. The second set of dances started with the Mazurka Set, followed by the Aherlow Set and the High Cauleed Cap. Brian Madigan won the 50/50 this month, and Emmett Murphy took home the "second chance" prize. We ended the evening with the Sneem Set, the Ballyvourney Jig Set, and the Clare Lancers Set.

On Wednesday, March 16th, we returned to one of our favorite senior residences, Willow Manor in Olney, where our longtime friend and supporter, Jeanette Schuder, is the activities coordinator. Jeanette's residents shared a pot luck corned beef supper just prior to our performance, and shared refreshments with our dancers, too. Our hour-long performance included standard figures from sets we love to dance, showing the residents a reel, a polka, a jig and a hornpipe. We also showed off a couple of more complicated figures of the Dublin, Limerick

Tumblers, and Antrim Square sets. The Outreach Ceili Band was in fine tune. With Dick de Freyre on whistle and flute, Marilyn Moore on whistle, Bridget Curran and Doug Ilg on bodhran, Paul O'Donnell on button accordion and Tom Scullen strumming the guitar, we treated the residents to some "live" tunes, and the band played for our polka figure, too. Tom led the group in some spirited sing-alongs, and also served as MC.



Our second performance venue was Victory Terrace in Potomac on Friday, March 18th. Over 40 residents had participated in a special dinner there, too, and we were served with the dessert! We had an audience participation waltz, and several residents gamely gave it a try. With Tom attending to family matters, Paul served as MC and Dixie led the sing-along for the residents. As several GWCC members discovered this month, San Antonio was an excellent location for the annual CCE North American Provincial Convention. For those of us who were able to arrive early, we were able to enjoy the Riverwalk, the Alamo, the Missions, the Hill Country wineries, and a couple brewpubs.

The Committee had set up event registration so that everything was ready when you checked in. The Airport Hilton really had their act together and was very reasonably priced; they also comped the parking and Internet fees. The food was excellent and there was plenty of it--the buffets were continually refreshed and the Banquet dinner featured two entrees. The bars were well stocked (i.e. they never ran out) and they had laid in a supply of Guinness.

The two ceili bands came from New York and also provided familiar and respected workshop leaders. On the planning side, the Mackens and Harrisons, whom we met at our Cape May Set Dance Weekend last October, kept the dancers in mind with a good dance floor, plenty of seating, water that never ran out, and a draft dance lineup that was available months in advance.

Workshops generally started on time and the Ceili Mor was less than an hour late (which is pretty good for this event). The Friday set dance workshop covered the Tory Island set and the first 3 figures of the Fermanagh Set of Quadrilles. The ceili that followed included the Tory Island set along with a recognizable selection of set dances. While I went to the accordion workshop with Patty Furlong (and Dick went to the flute workshop with Margie Mulvihill) on Saturday morning, other dancers attended the ceili dance and sean nós dance workshops.

The afternoon workshops covered the Moycullen and the Boyne sets, and some of us were invited by Padraig and Roisin McEneaney to dance in the demonstration set.

Once the banquet got organized people seemed to be enjoying the evening and the young musicians who performed were an inspiration to all of us. The Ceili Mor started aggressively with the Newport and Claddagh sets, High Cauleed Cap, and the Moycullen. There was a good number of newer dances and the workshop dances were called along with some of the others; on the other hand the Claddagh was danced with no caller. We were not able to stay for the end of the ceili, but I understand that they were able to keep the dancing rolling along since the band didn't stop for a break all night.



On Sunday, after Mass in the hotel and the brunch buffet, it was time for another dance workshop. This time it was the Valencia Right and Left along with several presentations on footwork which were helpful for both new and experienced dancers. The ceili that followed saw more substitutions than the previous ones, but the organizers had really striven to avoid repeating dance listss which were simply a shuffling of the same handful of sets each time and even at this last ceili the music was really rocking. The DC dancers wrapped up this weekend with an authentic Tex-Mex dinner just a few minutes stroll from the Hilton.

The site for next year's Convention is still undetermined, but they'll have a tough act to follow thanks to the hospitality of the folks in San Antonio.

BEV'S BEST BETS

The Historic Pubs of Dublin: A travelogue with a twist!

An aging and frail Frank McCourt narrates this 2008 “walk” through the Irish capital’s historic public houses, the places where political and literary history were made. Whether you’ve downed a Guinness in these pubs or not, you might enjoy spending an hour learning about their history or revisiting them from your armchair.

McCourt begins the tour at The Brazen Head, 800 years old, where in 1803 the United Irishmen, under the leadership of Robert Emmet among others, plotted to overthrow the British. The ghost of Emmet, who was hanged, drawn, and quartered for his part in the plot, supposedly haunts the pub. John Mulligan’s, built in 1782, serves only beer, no food. JFK and James Joyce both frequented this pub during their Dublin days. Then there’s a stop at Dublin Castle and Glasnevin Cemetery, where Michael Collins is buried. Funeral goers have to pass John Kavanaugh’s, opened in 1833, just a year after the adjacent burial grounds. Eugene Kavanaugh, the 6th generation to own the pub, explains how the phrase “go in’ for a jar” originated with grave diggers.

There’s a heavy literary association with Dublin’s pubs. The Palace Bar, part of the Temple Bar and watering hole for journalists from The Irish Times, was also a hangout for writers like Brendan Behan and Samuel Beckett. From The Palace McCourt segues into the Dublin Writer’s Museum, wherein a visitor can see memorabilia from and about Ireland’s four Nobel Prize winners. The “walk” continues through the grounds of Trinity College and its library’s Long Room with the Book of Kells on display. In keeping with the theme, the next stop is nearby O’Neill’s, one of the more ornate pubs complete with stained glass windows and an antique fireplace.

Doheny and Nesbitt’s, a favorite of politicians, of ten provides the backdrop for political deals. The Long Hall boasts a 250 year old clock that’s “still

ticking”! Part of the artifacts at John Kehoe’s and Toners are the antique cash registers that were used when these pubs also sold groceries. The Blue Light, a few miles from Dublin’s city center, hosts regular seisiuns. McCourt calls The Stag’s Head, complete with a stuffed deer head and fox, “one of Dublin’s finest pubs.” And so he should; the interior with stained glass and wood paneling is exactly what one would expect in a perfectly preserved Victorian era establishment. McDaid’s, noted as having been

Dublin’s morgue at one time, is also featured with a long shot of its extra high ceilings. McCourt stops at Neary’s, a rebel stronghold during the 1916 Easter Rebellion before ending the tour at O’Donoghue’s, famous for its traditional music and where the Clancy Brothers, Tommy Makem, and the Dubliners played in their early days.

There’s also a brief tour of the Guinness Brewery, where visitors can learn about the brewing process and just how very much a part of Irish life the porter is. No tour of Dublin would be complete without a stop at the old Jameson factory for a sample and a visit to a church (or two). Thus, St. Patrick’s Cathedral and the tomb of Jonathan Swift are also highlighted.

McCourt’s trek around Dublin is not just an interesting history of how Dublin’s pubs played a role in Irish politics and freedom; his narration includes poignant reminders of the institutionalized discrimination against women in all facets of Irish life that spilled over into the pubs. There’s also plenty of excellent original music provided by various individuals and groups appearing in the film, as well as colorful shots of Dublin’s more famous tourist spots and monuments.

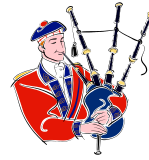

The dance for the April ceili is the Monaghan Set and was first introduced by Tom Quinn of Dundalk, County Louth, at Priddy, Somerset in May 1992. The set was revived by Joe O'Donovan and he taught it at the Buffalo Gap Workshop in 1994. It is also featured on the video "Set Dancing Made Easy" (Apollo Video - APV74) with Tom Quinn and his wife, Aine, teaching and demonstrating this and three other sets.

Patrick O'Dea also taught it at the Frost Center in 2002. The Monaghan Set is included in *Irish Dances* by Terry Moylon and in *Toss the Feathers* by Pat Murphy. Paul O'Donnell will be teaching the Monaghan Set at the April 17th ceili. Dance notes are on pages 13 and 14 of this newsletter.
